

## **Rules for Discharge of factory jacketed (not magnum) ammo in short range concealed carry practice at the Cincinnati Revolver Club (trial period) (RDFJASRCCPCRC catchy acronym!)**

- 1- No practice drawing from concealed carry is allowed on the range. The board recommends practicing and becoming proficient drawing at home with an unloaded weapon.
- 2- Short range shooting practice is only allowed from the 10 ft and 20 ft positions painted on the range floor in front of the downrange center (not numbered) position only.
- 3- Short range shooting practice is allowed only one shooter at a time and only if no one else wants to practice from the booths at 50'. Bullseye practice at the 50' position will always take precedence and NO jacketed ammo is to be fired from the booths.
- 4- The only jacketed ammo allowed from the short range position are factory loads or reloads at standard velocities. NO magnum loads allowed.
- 5- Use the wheeled cart to place your ammo, magazines and weapon. You must observe range safety and keep the muzzle pointed downrange at all times.
- 6- Targets will be available for purchase (or you can bring your own) and are to be stapled directly to the rubber hanging in the center (not numbered) position only. You're welcome to bring your own targets.
- 7- If you can't keep your shots on the paper you are expected to shoot from the 10 ft position and use both hands, a prop or rest until your skill develops to keep your shots on paper.
- 8- When finished, clean up, put your brass in a bucket (not garbage) and return the cart to under the shooting booth.

The board realizes a need among the members at CRC to be able to practice concealed carry and that often means jacketed bullets. In an attempt to facilitate this practice we have crafted these limited rules. It's important that all members understand the reason for these restraints and limitations.

Although the CRC has been around since 1908, it's been in the present building since 1965. If you walk around the back of the building you can see several places that have been patched because of repeated misses breaking through the concrete block. The bullet backstop does not cover the full back wall of the range. The target carrier framework is anchored to this back wall as well. At work parties we often work to mitigate damage to the framework as well as the back wall. By allowing concealed carry practice at short range we hope that you will responsibly take advantage of this new opportunity. This will be a trial period only through the spring to see how it works for members and range conditions.
